

September Holidays & Recognitions

National Hispanic Heritage Month is Sept. 15 to Oct. 15

This annual month-long observance celebrates the histories, culture, and contributions of Americans whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. The day of September 15 is significant because several Latin American <u>countries</u> celebrate independence or other holidays that day. The theme of the 2021 Hispanic Heritage Month is "<u>Esperanza: A</u> <u>Celebration of Hispanic Heritage and Hope</u>." Make sure to attend Dr. Ortega's guest lecture on 9/22 (details listed above) and check out other local ways to celebrate <u>National Hispanic Heritage Month in</u> <u>Denver</u>.

- Sept. 5 <u>International Day of Charity</u>, commemorating the passing away of Mother Teresa and promoting charitable efforts to alleviate human suffering
- Sept. 7, 8 Rosh Hashanah, Jewish New Year
- Sept. 8 <u>International Literacy Day</u>, reminding the public of the importance of literacy as a matter of dignity and human rights



- Sept. 15, 16 Yom Kippur, known as the Day of Atonement and the holiest day of the year in Judaism
- Sept. 23 <u>Bi Visibility Day</u>, recognizing and celebrating the bisexual community
